Norm was very close and dedicated to his family. You would always see Norm and Justine together and they were always happy. His time commitment to the City was tremendous, but Justine never complained.




1990 U.S. OLYMPIC FESTIVAL TORCH RUN

On June 2nd the eternal olympic flame left Pike's Peak, Colorado, and began its journey to Minnesota. Throughout its voyage to the many states, people from all walks of life volunteered to carry the flame to its final destination at the Hubert H. Humphrey Metrodome to begin the 1990 U.S. Olympic Festival.

The flame arrived in the City of Maplewood on the morning of the 4th of July. Over fifty people participated in carrying the flame through Maplewood on that day. The final leg of the journey found Acting Mayor George Rossbach carrying the torch across Keller Lake via a canoe. After beaching in our neighboring city, Mayor Rossbach delivered the flame to Little Canada's Mayor Michael Fahey. Mayor Rossbach commented after the torch was passed. "At first I wasn't aware of the significance of the event, but the enthusiasm kept building. We had good media coverage, and Maplewood had its special moment in the Olympic Festival."

COMMUNITY CENTER ADVISORY COMMITTEE


The Committee's task is to advise the City Council as to whether the City of Maplewood should build a community center, and if so, what facilities and activities should be housed in it. The Committee's task of collecting resident and potential user input is expected to begin in early September. It is anticipated that the Committee will schedule a public forum at which residents and activity groups may make a formal presentation about their thoughts about the proposed community center. The Committee's meetings will be posted on Maplewood's government cable channel 64, and updates will be provided through local newspapers.

1991 BUDGET

The City Manager presented the 1991 Proposed Budget at the July 23rd City Council meeting. Planned expenditures for 1991 total \$32.2 million. The allocation of this amount is indicated in the following chart.




Expenditures By Category

The Operations portion of the budget covers basic City services such as police, fire fighting, street maintenance, recreation programs, park maintenance, planning, building inspections, recycling and utility maintenance. Three new full-time positions are included in the 1991 Proposed Budget: Police Officer, Community Service Officer/Paramedic and a Street Maintenance Person. The total number of full-time employees included in the budget is 127.

The Capital Improvements portion of the budget covers the acquisition and construction of major facilities. The 1991 Proposed Budget implements the second year of the 1990-1994 Capital Improvement Plan which was adopted by the Council in July, 1989. Major items in the 1991 Capital Improvements portion of the budget are \$6.9 million for public improvement projects and \$6.0 million for the first phase of a community center.

The Debt Service portion of the budget covers the payment of principal and interest on the City's bonded indebtedness. General obligation bonds totaling \$6.2 million are anticipated to be sold in 1991. At the end of 1991, the City's bonded indebtedness will be \$33.3 million.

The 1991 Proposed Budget will be financed by revenues, use of surplus balances and bond issues as indicated in the following chart.



Resources in the 1991 Proposed Budget total \$21 million. Intergovernmental revenue (primarily state aid) accounts for 21% of the total. Other major revenue sources are charges for service and property taxes each of which account for 33% of the total. The City's tax levy for 1991 will be 6.9% higher than this year. In 1990, the City received 17% of the property taxes on property within the City. It is anticipated that this rate will not change significantly in 1991.

Further information on the City's 1991 Proposed Budget can be obtained by contacting the Finance Director at 770-4510. A public hearing on the 1991 Proposed Budget will be held between November 15th and December 20th.

The Maplewood City Council recently adopted a “**Truth-in-Sale-of-Housing Ordinance.**” This ordinance will apply to the sale of all residential properties in Maplewood after January 1, 1991. Sellers must complete a disclosure form and have an inspection completed before listing or showing the property. Sellers must hire a City approved housing inspector to do these inspections. Contact the City Clerk’s office after October 15, 1990 for a list of inspectors.

The purpose of this ordinance is to help protect potential residential property buyers. Giving people more information on the condition of a home before they buy will help them make a better decision.




MAPLEWOOD COMPREHENSIVE PLAN CARVER RIDGE NEIGHBORHOOD

The 13th planning neighborhood in the Maplewood Comprehensive Plan is the Carver Ridge neighborhood. Carver Ridge is located southeast of I-494. This neighborhood is primarily designated for low density residential use with the remaining land being classified as open space which includes a future park. When fully developed, Carver Ridge will be 78% residential and 22% open space.

EMERGENCY MANAGEMENT? WHAT DO THEY DO?

In the past, Emergency Management has had many titles: Emergency Services, Emergency Preparedness, Civil Defense; the function of which is often misunderstood by the public. For that reason, we would like to define the role and responsibilities of this office as applicable to the City of Maplewood.

The purpose of Emergency Management is to establish and maintain an emergency operational capability to save lives, minimize the effects of disasters, provide for continuity of government and mobilize resources to recover from any emergency. Past experiences and a study of current conditions show that the City of Maplewood must prepare for possible natural and man-made disaster situations such as severe thunderstorms, high winds, tornadoes, flooding, blizzards, breaks in pipelines, industrial accidents, aircraft emergencies, chemical fertilizer accidents, long-term power outages, and hazardous materials accidents.

The function of Emergency Management may be divided into three major categories:

I. Preplanning

One of the primary responsibilities of Emergency Management is to develop disaster plans and identify resources to be used in time of emergency.

Preplanning may be defined in five general statements:

1. Provide information to the public to allow maximum self-protection.
2. Develop methods to warn the public of impending danger.
3. Define and develop resources within the city and establish access to resources outside of the city.
4. Work with city department and businesses to develop individual plans and procedures to be activated in time of emergency.
5. Develop communications networks that will effectively meet our needs in an emergency.

II. EMERGENCY SITUATION

A common misconception is that during a disaster, Emergency Management takes over and directs activities of various departments in city government. There is no reason for Emergency Management personnel to preempt the expertise of police, fire, public works or any other department in the city.

The function of Emergency Management is to preplan for a variety of emergencies, then assist the individual disciplines in developing theirs. During an actual situation it is our responsibility to:

1. Work with city departments to coordinate their efforts with other departments or agencies.

2. Provide experts to assist the first responder in identification and/or size up of an incident, particularly in the case of a chemical situation, and to assist in the development of the protocol.
3. Assist in evacuation planning and execution, and arrange for transportation, food and shelter areas.
4. Provide an on-site communications/command post capable of handling on-site communication traffic, and provide an operational base for incident commanders.
5. Keep the Mayor, City Council and City Manager fully apprised of a situation as it develops and recommend courses of action in areas such as emergency declaration, securing National Guard assistance, contracting with private agencies, etc.
6. Solicit assistance of area Emergency Management Directors.
7. Disseminate information to the public and media.
8. Maintain appropriate logs for potential expenditure recovery.
9. Make appropriate notifications to State agencies as required by law.

III. RECOVERY

Many activities of recovery are a continuation of actions initiated during the actual emergency. This is the period of time, usually 2-3 days following a major disaster, when the reconstruction process begins. Considerations at this time include but are not limited to:

1. Determine state and federal assistance programs, such as low cost loans.
2. Consolidate records of expenditures, resources used, payroll costs, equipment repairs, mutual aid incurred costs, damage to public property, etc. for submittal to state and federal agencies for reimbursement.
3. Assessment of damages and surveying of affected areas can take several hours or days depending on the severity of the disaster. Plans have been developed to put damage assessment teams in action immediately following a disaster.
4. To provide for religious and psychological support for victims.


SUMMARY

It is recognized that Maplewood is unique, particularly in its configuration. In severe weather such as tornadoes, Maplewood presents a significant exposure to storms out of the southwest.

In addition to weather, the city also has three major Interstates adjacent to or bisecting the city, plus 2 railroads. These commercial arteries are always subject to a major transportation accident. We recognize that we have no control over or knowledge of the materials, many assuredly extremely hazardous, that pass through our city daily. Our best defense is to plan, train and equip to effectively meet the need should it arise. For that purpose the Office of Emergency Management develops a variety of programs to mitigate potential disasters.



PUBLIC SAFETY DEPARTMENT PARKING ORDINANCES

One of the most frequent complaints the Police Department receives is the enforcement of on-the-street parking regulations as they pertain to overnight parking on the streets of Maplewood. Property owners feel they pay taxes for the streets and roads in Maplewood. Therefore, they should have the right to use the street for parking overnight. Enforcement officers understand some residents' problems where there are several vehicles owned and driven in the household; however, Maplewood City Ordinances are clear, fill a need, and must be enforced.

City Ordinance 18-27 states "parking any vehicle upon any street or road for more than two (2) hours between the hours of 2 a.m. and 6 a.m. is hereby prohibited." **This ordinance is enforced 365 days a year.**

City Ordinance Section 36-22 of the Zoning Code states minimum off-street parking for single-family dwellings shall be not less than two spaces. Multiple dwellings shall provide a minimum of two spaces for each household unit. The Zoning Code thus implies all residential homes or apartment houses shall provide off-street parking for all vehicles which may be domiciled there.

The following is a brief list of why the Public Safety department feels the Ordinances are good and should be enforced:

1. Snow plowing — This is a very obvious reason. All residents appreciate their streets plowed wide and clean as early in the morning as possible. Cars left on the streets greatly hinder the Public Works Department from doing the first-class job of plowing and sanding our streets that they want to do for you.
2. Most of the city's streets are not wide enough for vehicles to meet if cars were parked on both sides.
3. If on-street parking were allowed, it could encourage people to leave junk vehicles in need of repair in the streets for long periods of time.
4. Homeowner's security — Vehicles left in the street now become suspect and are regularly checked by police. If all-night parking were allowed, police naturally would relax their checks.
5. Off-street parking eliminates crime opportunities. Seldom do we have vehicles stripped or stolen from private driveways. Car stripping and thefts would increase if vehicles were allowed on the street all night.
6. If on-street parking were allowed in high-density apartment or townhouse facilities, our streets would be full of vehicles.

During the months of September and October, Minnesotans can still expect some hot, dry weather with little rainfall. Although water conservation should become a habit practiced throughout the year, here are some helpful summer hints on ways to save water in our homes and outdoors.

IN THE HOUSE

Automatic dishwashers and washing machines are water guzzlers, so wash full loads only.

Avoid running the faucet for a glass of cold water. Put a bottle or pitcher of water in the refrigerator.

Be alert for leaky faucets and toilets and make repairs immediately. A small leak can waste hundreds of gallons daily.

Turn on the bathroom faucets only when needed. Up to five gallons a minute goes down the drain when faucets are left running while you are shaving or brushing your teeth.



OUTDOORS

When you are washing your car or pet, use a hose with nozzle or use a bucket. A continuously running hose wastes water.

Water lawns and gardens only when needed and only during the early morning or evening when evaporation is lower.

Sweep sidewalks and driveways instead of washing them down with a hose. If it doesn't grow, don't water it.

Cutting grass at a two or three inch height instead of cropping it closely will reduce the amount of water the lawn will need.

Water is a precious commodity — **USE IT WISELY!**



Danger – Children and Lighters



KEEP CIGARETTE LIGHTERS AWAY FROM YOUNG CHILDREN

Do you know that your 3 year old child may be capable of lighting your cigarette lighter?

About 200 deaths each year are associated with fires started by cigarette lighters. Of these, an estimated 140 deaths are the result of children playing with lighters; most of the victims are less than 5 years old. Children who survive such fires are often severely burned, resulting in disfigurement for life and emotional adjustment problems. Many of these tragedies are avoidable.

Cigarette lighters, particularly disposable ones, are fascina-

ting to many children. They —

- are colorful,
- fit easily into a small hand,
- have a wheel that turns and emits sparks, and
- produce a small flame.

This is a recipe for disaster. Children less than five years are twice as likely to die in a fire as older age groups and this is largely because of fires started by children playing with matches or lighters. Children as young as two or three years are known to have ignited these fires. When a fire occurs, children frequently run and hide rather than informing an adult or trying to escape.

NEVER ALLOW YOUR CHILD TO PLAY WITH A LIGHTER

Keep lighters out of sight and out of your child's reach. Never encourage a child to play with a lighter or to think of it as a toy. Do not use it as a source of amusement for a child. Once their curiosity is aroused, children may seek out a lighter and try to light it.

Remember – Small children *can* light cigarette lighters!

Dear Friends:



1991 will bring some important issues before the City Council. For example:

- **Recycling.** Maplewood residents are only recycling 24 pounds per person. The City will be providing information on recyclable materials and expanding the City's curbside recycling program, hopefully adding more containers to encourage our residential recycling efforts.

COMMUNITY CENTER UPDATE

On Monday, November 19th, the Maplewood Community Center Advisory Committee presented its formal recommendation to the City Council concerning the construction of a proposed community center.

In the fall of 1989, a consultant conducted a community survey of Maplewood residents to see how they felt about their community, City services, quality of life and gathered other information about City residents such as age, occupation, and length of residency. The results of the random telephone survey are accurate within a 5% margin. The survey results showed an overwhelming positive response, more than a 2 to 1 margin, supporting a new community center. Residents ranked their preferred recreational activities, least preferred activities, potential attendance, and what an appropriate membership fee would be.

As a result of that survey, the City Council appointed a Community Center Advisory Committee to study and make a formal recommendation to the City Council whether the proposed center should proceed or not. If the Committee determined that the project should proceed, the recommendation should also include proposed uses and facilities in the building.

It is this formal recommendation that was presented to the City Council on November 19th. The recommendation consisted of four parts.

- 1) The Committee recommended that the City proceed with the construction of a City—owned community center.
- 2) The proposed facility is intended to benefit all lifestyles and ages, and it should include space and equipment for many, many activities. An abbreviated list includes gymnasiums, leisure and competitive pools, track, community meeting rooms, adult/senior and teen areas, exercise/weight room, theater, and community social services office space.
- 3) To assist the City Council in determining the feasibility of the center to support its own operating costs and to determine appropriate membership fees, it was recommended to obtain a market analysis of similar facilities (or lack of) in the surrounding area.
- 4) The final recommendation was to select an architect to prepare a preliminary building design and provide construction cost estimate.

The funds for the construction of the proposed center are a combination of tax increment financing (TIF) and general obligation bonds.

The City Council will discuss the Committee's recommendations at the December 10, 1990 City Council meeting. As scheduled, the first meeting of the month is Cable-cast, 7 p.m., Channel 64.

CONSERVATION TIPS FOR DRIVERS

During a time when gasoline prices are escalating at a rapid pace and the environment needs our attention, here are a few ways in which you can conserve and do your part in cleaning up our environment:

- Drive sensibly ... don't waste gas.
- Keep your car tuned up.
- Carpool (Call 349-RIDE for information).
- Use public transit.
- Ride your bike or walk instead.
- Buy a more gas efficient car.
- Recycle your engine oil.
- Keep your tires properly inflated to save gas.
- Recycle your old tires.
- Keep your wheels in alignment to save your tires.
- Don't litter.

SEWER UTILITY RATES

Sewer utility rates finance (1) the cost to operate and maintain the City's sewers and (2) the City's charges from the Metropolitan Waste Control Commission (MWCC) to operate, maintain and expand MWCC sewers and treatment plants. MWCC bills the City based on the estimated volume of wastewater coming from the city. The City's bill is adjusted for any amounts owed by or to the MWCC. Two-thirds of the City's projected 1991 sewer utility operating expenses are charges from the MWCC.

MWCC's rates have increased mainly because of public and governmental demands to meet increasingly higher environmental expectations and standards. While concerns are becoming broader, finances are limited. At one time, grant revenues financed as much as 80 percent of the capital expenditures in a given year. Next year, grants will pay about one percent of the capital expenditures. In 1991, MWCC expenditures are limited to the same level as 1990, plus a rate of inflation. This means that funds for new projects must come from efficiencies or savings from on-going operations.

More specifically, MWCC's charges to the City increased 6 percent from 1990 to 1991. Three factors determine this percentage. The volume of wastewater treated remains unchanged. MWCC costs increased 6 percent. The third part of the City's bill, which reflects adjustment from last year's estimated bill, remains unchanged.

City residents will not pay higher sewer utility rates in 1991 because reserve balances will be used to finance the increases in operating expenses.



NORTHEAST SUBURBAN TRANSIT

Door-to-door public transit service

A mini-bus will take you anywhere in the cities of Maplewood, North St. Paul and Oakdale, as well as to Northeast Metro Technical Institute, Lakewood Community College, Hillcrest and Sun Ray Shopping Centers. The fare is \$1.00 per one-way ride. **(The fare will be \$1.25 per one-way ride starting January 1, 1991.)**

To reserve a ride, call 227-NEST **(227-6378)**. An order-taker will schedule a ride for you. Remember to allow plenty of time for your ride because you may share your ride with other passengers, and that could require additional time on the bus. The order-taker will give you an **approximate** time of pick up and drop off. The time of pick up and drop off cannot be exact because the service is a shared-ride service, and the bus does not have an exact route to take that can be predictable or precise. If you can be somewhat flexible in your schedule, NEST should work well for you.

NEST service hours are 6:30 a.m. to 6:30 p.m. Monday through Friday, and 8:00 a.m. to 3:00 p.m. Saturday. The order-takers will answer your call between 8:00 a.m. and 4:30 p.m. Monday through Friday, and 8:00 a.m. to 3:00 p.m. Saturday. Your call for a ride should be made at least two (2) hours before your desired pick-up time.

If your plans change after arranging for your ride, please call 227-NEST to cancel your pick-up. Your cancellation call will save the driver and other passengers from making an unnecessary trip to your scheduled pick-up place. The driver, as well as the other passengers, will greatly appreciate your courtesy in making a cancellation call to 227-NEST, should your plans change.

Children under 5 years of age must be accompanied by an adult on NEST buses. Children older than 5 years of age must be accompanied to the bus and met at the destination. NEST drivers are on a tight schedule and are not able to care for children at a drop-off point. For the safety of the child, arrangements must be made to meet the child at the drop-off place and stay with the child until NEST arrives for the pick up.

NEST is managed by the Northeast Suburban Transit (NEST) Commission, a group of two elected officials from each of the three sponsoring cities (Maplewood, North St. Paul and Oakdale). NEST's costs are paid by farebox revenue, funding from the three cities and from the Regional Transit Board, and miscellaneous donations. NEST is a nonprofit organization.

HELP WANTED ... VOLUNTEER SIREN MONITORS NEEDED!

Within the City of Maplewood we currently have an outdoor warning system which consists of 11 sirens. These outdoor warning sirens are used to alert the public of potentially life-threatening situations such as severe weather, chemical spills and, of course, nuclear attack, to name a few.

Our job is to ensure that the system is adequate and the sirens are well maintained and operating properly. We do not actually "push the button," however, we can request that a specific siren or any number of sirens be sounded within Maplewood.

In order for us to properly maintain the siren system, we need some way to monitor the sirens during monthly tests and actual activations. One way that we are alerted to possible problems is through the radio control system. In brief, when the sirens are activated by the Ramsey County Sheriff's Office, a radio signal is sent out to each siren. In turn, each siren sends a signal back to the equipment at the Sheriff's Office. A printout is then generated indicating which sirens did not report back properly. Unfortunately, this system is not foolproof and does not indicate every problem that comes up.

We do not have enough manpower to send to every siren during regular monthly testing, nor do we know exactly when sirens will be activated due to a threatening situation. This is where we need your help. Throughout Maplewood we have a group of volunteer residents who monitor the sirens whenever they are activated and report back to us using self-addressed, pre-stamped postcards provided by our office.

Sirens are tested on the first Wednesday of each month at 1:00 p.m. and once during the spring in conjunction with the annual Tornado Awareness Week activities, in addition to any actual activations for severe weather, etc. On the postcard we have provided, the siren monitor records the date the siren was activated, their name and address, checks off the appropriate statement (siren did work, siren did not work, I was not home, etc.), then drops the postcard in the mailbox. The cards are reviewed and if a siren did not operate properly, repair procedures will begin immediately.

We are currently in need of volunteer siren monitors throughout Maplewood. If you live in one of the siren areas listed below, are normally home during the day and would be willing to assist us with our siren monitor program, please give us a call at 770-4547 or stop by our office in the public works building at 1902 East County Road B, upper level, 9 a.m. - 6 p.m.


Additionally, during 1991 we will be updating our outdoor warning system in an effort to better serve and protect citizens. This will be done by replacing old sirens (over half of our sirens are 30 years old) and by filling in the gaps.

The outdoor warning siren system is intended to alert you and your neighbors. Please help us ensure that the system will work properly when our community needs it by volunteering as a siren monitor.

1991 BUDGET

The City Council adopted the 1991 Budget at a public hearing on November 15th. Planned expenditures for 1991 total \$32.2 million. The allocation of this amount is indicated in the following chart.




Expenditures By Category

The Operations portion of the budget covers basic City services such as police, fire fighting, street maintenance, recreation programs, park maintenance, planning, building inspections, recycling and utility maintenance. Three new full-time positions are included in the 1991 Budget: Police Officer, Community Service Officer/Paramedic and a Street Maintenance Person. The total number of full-time employees included in the budget is 127.

The Capital Improvements portion of the budget covers the acquisition and construction of major facilities. The 1991 Budget implements the second year of the 1990-1994 Capital Improvement Plan which was adopted by the Council in July, 1989. Major items in the 1991 Capital Improvements portion of the budget are \$6.9 million for public improvement projects and \$6.0 million for the first phase of a proposed community center.

The Debt Service portion of the budget covers the payment of principal and interest on the City's bonded indebtedness. General obligation bonds totaling \$6.2 million are anticipated to be sold in 1991. At the end of 1991, the City's bonded indebtedness will be \$33.3 million.

The 1991 Budget will be financed by revenues, use of surplus balances and bond issues as indicated in the following chart.

Revenues in the 1991 Budget total \$21 million. Intergovernmental revenue (primarily state aid) accounts for 21% of the total. Other major revenue sources are charges for service and property taxes each of which account for 33% of the total. The City's tax levy for 1991 will be 9.7% higher than this year. In 1990, the City received 17% of the property taxes on property within the City. It is anticipated that this rate will not change significantly in 1991.

The estimated 1991 increase in City property taxes on an average home will be \$11. The table below shows how this estimate was calculated.

On a \$70,000 home, City property taxes will increase by approximately \$9. For a \$100,000 home, it's estimated the increase will be \$13.

PUBLIC SAFETY DEPARTMENT PARKING ORDINANCES


One of the most frequent complaints the Police Department receives is the enforcement of on-the-street parking regulations as they pertain to overnight parking on the streets of Maplewood. Property owners feel they pay taxes for the streets and roads in Maplewood. Therefore, they should have the right to use the street for parking overnight. Enforcement officers understand some residents' problems where there are several vehicles owned and driven in the household; however, Maplewood City Ordinances are clear, fill a need, and must be enforced.

City Ordinance 18-27 states "parking any vehicle upon any street or road for more than two (2) hours between the hours of 2 a.m. and 6 a.m. is hereby prohibited." **This ordinance is enforced 365 days a year.**

City Ordinance Section 36-22 of the Zoning Code states minimum off-street parking for single-family dwellings shall be not less than two spaces. Multiple dwellings shall provide a minimum of two spaces for each household unit. The Zoning Code thus implies all residential homes or apartment houses shall provide off-street parking for all vehicles which may be domiciled there.

The following is a brief list of why the Public Safety Department feels the Ordinances are good and should be enforced:

1. **Snow plowing** — This is a very obvious reason. All residents appreciate their streets plowed wide and clean as early in the morning as possible. Cars left on the streets greatly hinder the Public Works Department from doing the first-class job of plowing and sanding our streets that they want to do for you.
2. Most of the city's streets are not wide enough for vehicles to meet if cars were parked on both sides.
3. If on-street parking were allowed, it could encourage people to leave junk vehicles in need of repair in the streets for long periods of time.
4. Homeowner's security — Vehicles left in the street now become suspect and are regularly checked by police. If all-night parking were allowed, police naturally would relax their checks.
5. Off-street parking eliminates crime opportunities. Seldom do we have vehicles stripped or stolen from private driveways. Car stripping and thefts would increase if vehicles were allowed on the street all night.
6. If on-street parking were allowed in high-density apartment or townhouse facilities, our streets would be full of vehicles.






