

NEW MAYOR AND COUNCILMAN

As a result of City Elections on November 8, 1977, a new Mayor and Councilman were elected for Maplewood. John Greavu began his term of office as Mayor on January 12th, the first Council meeting in 1978. With 13 years of experience as a Councilman, Mayor Greavu has also been active in the community serving on a number of appointive boards which include the Cancer Society of Maplewood and North St. Paul, the St. Paul-Ramsey County Criminal Justice Coordinating Committee and was past President and Vice President of the Ramsey County League of Local Governments. For the past 34 years he has been employed by Great Northern and presently is Manager, Executive Food Service Division, for Burlington Northern. John and his wife Ramona have 4 children and for the past 27 years have been residents of Maplewood.

New to elected office in Maplewood is Councilman Earl Nelson, who was elected to fill 1 of 2 available Council seats in the November election. Earl and his wife Luella have been Maplewood residents for 19 years and have 2 sons, age 30 and 34. He is active in the Maplewood-Ferndale Association and is a former Maplewood City Engineer. A graduate of William Mitchell College of Law, Councilman Nelson practices law for a firm in Newport.

NEW PUBLIC WORKS BUILDING

At the February 8, 1977 special election, voters authorized the issuance of bonds totaling \$995,000 for construction of a Public Works facility. On November 17th, the Council authorized a construction contract with Langer Construction Company, who submitted the lowest bid of eight received. Construction is scheduled to start in February and be completed by September 1, 1978. The total project is estimated to cost approximately \$1,155,000. This is greater than the original estimate because construction costs have risen this past year faster than originally anticipated. The additional \$160,000 will be financed primarily from the following sources: (1) interest on proceeds from the \$995,000 bonds sold during April, 1977, (2) 1977 federal revenue sharing monies originally budgeted for improvements to the present City Public Works facility, (3) monies included in the City's 1978 budget for utilities at the new Public Works facility which was based on twelve months of building operations instead of the revised three months of operations. DID YOU KNOW???

The old Gladstone Shops of the St. Paul and Duluth Railroad has stood on the corner of Frost and English in our City of Maplewood for 90 years.

This landmark could disappear in the near future, and be replaced by apartments, office buildings or a small shopping center.

These shops were built in a bygone era, when steam was the means of power and when most of the work at the shop was done with steam powered machinery. It was considered, in those days, that black smoke from the boilers powering this machinery, emitting from tall stacks, was a sign of progress and prosperity.

There is a book telling the history of the Gladstone shops and calling attention to these shops before they disappear and to the many employees that once worked in these shops that once were an important part of the St. Paul area and way of life.

The next time you go by the corner of Frost and English,* this book will make you pause for a moment, and imagine yourself back in the 1890's. You will be able to see the black smoke coming from the tall stack of the shops and hear the sounds of the steam engine. You can hear the sounds of the anvils and steam hammer from the blacksmith shop. Watch the American type locomotives giving off smoke and steam as they come and go from the round house and shuttling cars to and from the shops. You can see the excitement of the Fall day in 1894, when engine number 69 is brought in for repairs of the damage it received while saving over 300 people from the Hinkley Forest Fire. Listen to the workers discuss over their lunch pails, the Pullman strike in Chicago, the election of McKinley as president, the blowing up of the battleship Maine in Havana Harbor and the war that followed.

When you bring yourself back to the present, you see a 90 year old man who was once young, active and gave birth to a town but who is now worn by time, waiting for his long life to end and to be forgotten.

APPLYING FOR A BUILDING PERMIT

In order to avoid confusion in applying for a building permit, the Building Inspection Department has requested that the following information be presented before an application for a building permit is made:

1. Proof of ownership of the property.
2. Two complete sets of construction plans.
3. Legal description of property on which proposed work is to be done by lot, block, tract.
4. Energy Calculations.
5. A site plan indicating all setbacks (from property lines and existing buildings).
6. Ramsey County or State Driveway permit (where required).
7. Names of general contractor and all sub-contractors. All must be licensed prior to issuance of building permit (Electrical contractor – State License; Plumbing Contractor – State license and local registration).
8. Building permit must be signed by person or a representative of the firm constructing the home.

NOTE: If homeowner is constructing home, he must also be licensed as a general contractor (ask for further information).

NEW DEVELOPMENT FOR MAPLEWOOD

The following new development is occurring in Maplewood:

The Town Crier Pancake House is located between Ripley Avenue and North St. Paul Road, east of White Bear Avenue. The Town Crier will seat up to 108 persons.

Product Manufacturing, an office-industrial building, is located on the westerly side of Highway 61, north of the Maple Leaf Drive In. Stage I of this five stage development will contain a machine shop.

A new Denny's Restaurant is going up on the northeast corner of Woodlyn Avenue and White Bear Avenue. Denny's will seat approximately 100 people.

Maplewood Square, a new retail center, is being constructed between the Maplewood Mall and White Bear Avenue. This center will contain about 16 shops and also provide restaurant facilities.

SERGEANT DEROCKER RETIRES

Sergeant Robin DeRocker retired on January 5th, 1978, from the Maplewood Police Department. DeRocker is the first City policeman to retire in the department's history. He was employed in August of 1957 as a part-time police officer for the Village of Maplewood. As Maplewood grew and the force expanded, DeRocker became a full-time police officer in September 1960 and was promoted to Sergeant in October 1961.

Sergeant DeRocker's smiling, friendly face will be missed around the City. He has been the Day Patrol Sergeant for several years and was the City Police License Inspector.

The Maplewood Police Department held a retirement dinner for Robin, which was attended by approximately 200 persons on Friday, December 30, 1977. He was presented with a recognition plaque and his badge, number nine was retired. DeRocker also received a hand-made graphite Fly Rod. The North St. Paul-Maplewood Chamber of Commerce awarded the Sergeant with its Community Service Award. He also received a cash donation to get his retirement off to a flying start.

Robin and his wife, Aurora, plan to spend the rest of the winter with Aurora's parents in Massachusetts and then move to Montana, where he plans to go into business and make good use of the Fly Rod in Montana's many trout streams.

Sergeant DeRocker and his wife have resided since 1953 at 2063 Sloan Street, Maplewood, where his family of four boys and one girl grew up. He and his wife, Aurora, are grandparents of seven grandchildren, all girls.

DeRocker is also a Charter Member of the Parkside Fire Department and has been a volunteer fireman with Parkside for 19 years.

 - **Senior Boys Slow Pitch** – This league is open to all Maplewood and School District #622 youths in grades 9-12 as of May 1, 1978. Each team must have a responsible adult as Team Manager.

PART TIME EMPLOYEES

REGISTRATION

1. Registrations will be taken for all programs until one week prior to the first session, unless noted otherwise. NO PHONE registrations will be accepted.
2. Complete registration form and return it with a check, payable to "City of Maplewood", to Maplewood Community Services, 1380 Frost Avenue, Maplewood, Minnesota 55109. (Hours: Monday-Friday 8:00 a.m.-5:00 p.m.)
3. Where activities have limited space, they will be filled on a first come, first serve basis. Persons are not considered registered until their fee has been paid.
4. If an activity should fill up, a waiting list will be started. Additional sessions may be formed if there is a sufficient waiting list and if space and instructors are available.
5. Instructors are not permitted to accept registration at the activity location unless otherwise noted in the brochure as a program that does not require pre-registration.
6. NO registration will be accepted for any activity after the second session. In addition, NO discount is authorized for late registration.
7. You will only receive further notification if the class is cancelled or changed.

REFUNDS AND CANCELLATIONS

1. A full refund will only be made if requested at least 24 hours before the first activity session.
2. A \$1.00 service charge will be made on refunds after the first activity session is held. No refunds will be made after the second session is held.
3. The Community Services Office reserves the right to cancel any activity due to insufficient enrollment.
4. If a class instructor for some reason cancels one session, a make-up session will be held immediately after the program is scheduled to terminate.
5. The After School programs will not be held when school is not in session.



MAPLEWOOD ARBOR CELEBRATION '78

WHEREAS, the City of Maplewood is well known for its beautiful and wooded environs that provide a serene and healthful setting for our lives; and

WHEREAS, our City's trees provide a wide and colorful backdrop that act as a link with our heritage and symbolize hope for the future; and

WHEREAS, the increasing destruction that is being wreaked by the Dutch Elm and Oak Wilt diseases by decimating our shade trees more persistently every year; and

WHEREAS, the wooded lands that have attracted us here to live and grow are rapidly being denuded;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF MAPLEWOOD, MINNESOTA, hereby proclaims the period from April 28 through May 31 as "Maplewood Arbor Celebration '78"; and does call upon all citizens of Maplewood to become aware of trees and the role that they play in our lives; and does encourage all its citizens to plant trees **NOW** and to provide for their care so that we and our children may continue to benefit from these most wonderful members of the plant kingdom.


GO OUT ON A LIMB FOR MAPLEWOOD

Maplewood recently purchased a tree moving machine and is on the outlook for trees to be transplanted into City Parks. If you are building an addition, or garage, or would just like to donate a tree, we have a park for you. The following points should be considered before donating a tree:

1. A maximum of 4"-5" diameter is the biggest tree we can accept.
2. The tree must be at least 5' from any building.
3. Optimum transplanting time is May and June.
4. The truck is 35' in length and 8' wide and 7'6" high and weighs 3 tons.
5. We cannot accept diseased trees.

If you would like to have a tree removed from your property, contact our office at 777-8131, ext. 40, and one of our staff will visit your home to determine if we can move the tree.

By donating your tree, you will save the time and effort of removing the tree yourself or paying to have it removed. You will also receive a great deal of satisfaction from knowing your gift is being enjoyed by others. We will begin moving trees as soon as the ground has thawed and it is dry enough to work on without damaging the turf.



CHANGES TAKING PLACE IN MAPLEWOOD

The City Council has recently approved two new subdivisions on McKnight Road between Linwood and Highwood Avenue. The Van Dahl Addition will have 17 single family lots and the Venture Woods Addition will have 14 single family lots.

Council also has recently approved building plans for two new office buildings for the Monson Insurance Company. They will be located on Cope Avenue, south of the Mr. Steak Restaurant.

Maplewood's Comprehensive Land Use Plan has been amended to permit low density apartments and townhouses on the vacant property south of Radatz and west of White Bear Avenue.

Maplewood's Fence Ordinance was amended to permit commercial and industrial establishments to have fences with a maximum height of 10 feet. Previously, only 6 foot fences were allowed.

Council recently approved a zone change on a 21.62 acre tract of land located between Hazelwood Avenue and the Northern Pacific Railway and Beam Avenue and County Road B. This land, which was zoned farm residential, is now zoned M-1, Light Manufacturing.

Ramsey County has just completed the installation of a Computer Assisted Property Appraisal System to be used to produce the estimated market value on all single family residential property in the county. This Council began its term in January of 1978 with a new Mayor, John Greavu and a new Councilman, Earl Nelson (see article on page 2 of January-February 1978 issue of "Maplewood in Motion"). Councilman Wiegert's term runs through December of 1979, and Councilman Anderson was elected in November of 1977 to his 2nd four-year term. Fontaine, appointed by the Mayor to a four-year term on January 12, 1978, and a Maplewood resident for 35 years, is employed by Athens Realty and is also a Twin Cities representative of Fahning Homes. TRAINING FOR CITY EMPLOYEES

In the last few months, City employees have participated in several training programs. Approximately twenty-five people attended a workshop sponsored by the Munci-Pals and the University of Minnesota in January. The workshop, titled "Office Communications: A Skills Development Workshop", focused on increased awareness and development of communication skills needed for good job performance. Primary instructor for the seminar was Dr. George Shapiro, Professor of Speech-Communications at the University of Minnesota.

CPR (cardio-pulmonary resuscitation) courses were held during February and March and were attended by approximately fifty employees. This training was in-house and was taught by Maplewood's Paramedics. Sudden death from heart attack is the most important medical emergency today and it seems probable that a large number of these deaths can be prevented by prompt, appropriate treatment. In addition, many victims who die as a result of such accidental causes as drowning, electrocution, suffocation, drug intoxication, or automobile accidents could be saved by the prompt and proper application of cardiopulmonary resuscitation and emergency cardiac care. This can best be assured by the victim's entry into an organized and effective system of emergency cardiac care starting with prompt CPR.



WATER LEAKS

While driving home one evening, a Maplewood employee noticed a flow of water in the gutter at the side of a street. When he came to the end of that block, he could see the water was flooding a large area of the side street. Since there hadn't been rain for days, it was obvious that a water main or service was leaking.

This employee returned to the site of the water flow and notified the resident who lived there. The resident had been unaware of the leak but stated he would notify the Water Department.

In view of the amount of water in the street, it was obvious that the leak had been flowing in the street for some time. The damage that a leak in a water main can cause is enormous. Erosion under the pavement and boulevard areas can cause a street to cave in, possibly leading to injury of a motorist or pedestrian, not to mention extensive damage to the street structure itself.

Flooding of low adjacent areas could also cause property damage. Freezing weather could further create serious hazards to motorists. A loss of great amounts of water is an expensive waste and also causes lower pressures in the system. A quick phone call to the local Police Department or Utility Department could prevent extensive damage or even injury to pedestrians and motorists. Your call may be the first notification and could just save the day.

BIKE RODEOS

Spring is just around the corner which means it's time to get your bicycle out of storage! A number of bike rodeos and safety checks will be held this spring to start the season out safely.

During the week of April 17-20, bicycle registrations and safety checks will be led by trained bicycle mechanics and police officers at various local elementary schools. The safety check will include inspection for glaring safety defects such as bike size, worn-out tires, loose handlebars or chains, missing reflectors, etc. The registration will involve the assignment of Operation I.D. numbers. These clinics are open to all ages from youth to senior citizens who own bicycles and wish to participate.

Following these clinics, bike rodeos will be held between April 24 and May 4, again at local elementary schools. The rodeos, open to 1st-6th grade children, will involve demonstration of traffic rule knowledge and smooth operation of one's bike. Police Reserve Officers will do the judging at all rodeos. One winner from each school will then be selected to go to the district rodeo on May 6 at John Glenn Jr. High. Trophies and savings bonds will be awarded.

SPRING CLEANUP CAMPAIGN

During the month of May 1978, the Maplewood Police Department will be conducting a citywide cleanup campaign. This campaign will involve patrol officers noting the location of accumulated debris, junk, unused vehicles, etc., and issuing a written police order to the owner of the property or the owner's agent, giving them ten (10) days time to remove or garage the items. Under City Ordinance, a vehicle is deemed to be unused if it is not currently licensed. Any unlicensed vehicle must be kept in a garage or other facility out of public view.

The campaign will apply to residences, businesses, apartment buildings, and complexes. Failure to comply with the written order will result in a summons being issued and a fine of up to \$300.

Please, let's all cooperate and make Maplewood a more attractive and safer place to live. Tell your neighbors about the campaign and urge them to cooperate.



LIQUOR LICENSE LIMITS

The Maplewood City Council has been discussing the problems which may arise when the City reaches its statutory limit for the number of "on-sale" liquor licenses. Such licenses allow businesses, usually restaurants, lounges and supper clubs, to sell liquor by the drink for consumption on the premises of the sale. Maplewood's statutory limit (based on population) for such licenses is eighteen. Maplewood presently has fourteen "on-sale" liquor licenses issued. The City's limit will not increase again, without an election, until our population reaches 45,000. Maplewood's present population is approximately 28,000. State law does allow for an increase in the number of "on-sale" licenses if a majority of the voters approve of an increase at an election. The Council is considering the possibility of putting such a question on the ballot.

The City also issues "off-sale" liquor licenses which allow the sale of liquor in the original container for consumption off the premises where the sale is made. There is no limit to the number of these licenses which may be issued by a City. Maplewood has a total of ten "off-sale" licenses now active.

NEW DEVELOPMENT FOR MAPLEWOOD

The City Council has recently approved these new developments:

1. Building 225, a new five story office building at 3M Center;
2. A canine training facility for the St. Paul Police Department south of Roselawn and east of Soo Line Railroad;
3. A PAKO Photo filmshop at Frost Avenue and Clarence Avenue in the Maplewood Foods parking lot;
4. Connemara II, a 96 unit condominium building on Londin Lane.

The City Council has also recently approved the following new subdivisions:

1. The LaCosse Addition is a five parcel subdivision located at the southeast corner of Kohlman Avenue and Elm Street.
2. The Ridgewind Addition is a 13 lot subdivision and is located east of Germain Street at Brooks Avenue.
3. The Rehnberg First Addition is a 21 parcel subdivision located south of County Road B at Germain Street.

TREE INSPECTION

Well, it's that time of year again! The red rings and X's are appearing on our elm trees which means that our tree inspectors and elm bark beetles are back on the job. Although the cold spring delayed the Dutch elm season this year, we are now in full swing. The tree inspectors are checking wood piles and are looking for the first signs of Dutch elm disease in trees. We hope you will cooperate with us again this year and help to maintain the high quality of our Shade Tree Disease Control program.

If you need to remove elm wood or elm trees you must do one of the following:

1. Call a City Tree Inspector and arrange for the City Tree Removal Contractor to remove your wood or tree. You must have the City Tree Removal Contractor remove your wood or tree to be eligible for Grant-in-Aid.
2. Cut down your elm trees yourself and properly dispose of the wood in one of the following ways:
 - a. Take your elmwood to a diseased tree disposal site. Ramsey County is operating a disposal site at Vadnais Heights that is free of charge. The site is located on Centerville Road, 1/2 mile South of State Highway 96. It will be open Monday through Friday, 8:00 a.m. to 8:00 p.m., and on Saturdays from 8:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. The site will be closed Sundays and holidays.
 - b. Strip the bark completely from the elmwood. When the bark and the wood are separated from each other, they are no longer hazardous.

Call us if you have any questions and we will be glad to help out. We give free tree inspections, too! If you need a tree inspector, call 777-8131. Let's continue to save our elm trees and have our control program continue to serve as a model for the rest of the state, as well.

PROMOTION

Igor Fejda, temporary Tree Inspector in the Public Works Department, has been promoted to the position of Forestry Technician, effective June 6, 1978. Igor's past experience and education includes jobs with the University of Minnesota and the Minnesota Department of Natural Resources, as well as a B.S. degree in Forestry. In Mr. Fejda's new position, his duties will include directing the inspection of all public and private property for diseased, dead or hazardous elms and oaks, writing disease program reports and relating information to the public and other City personnel regarding proper tree control measures and management principles.





PUBLIC WORKS IS ON THE MOVE

Construction is well underway on the new municipal garage located on County Road B east of White Bear Avenue. The facility will cost 12 million dollars and will house the maintenance operations for the Parks, Streets and Utilities functions. In addition, the administrative offices of the Public Works and Community Development Department will be located in the facility. A September occupancy is anticipated.

Limited changes in some of the City's administrative procedures will be required when the Community Development and Public Works Department (includes the Engineering Department) move from the existing municipal building. Individuals who have frequent contact with these departments should make special note of the move. The City staff is working to coordinate the interaction of City departments once they are separated to provide the least possible inconvenience to residents.

The first floor of the Maplewood Municipal Building (also known as City Hall) will undergo remodeling to provide more efficient use of existing space. In conjunction with this project, plans are also underway to modernize the telephone system serving City offices. We hope to move into the new facility, remodel existing City Hall offices and complete the telephone system changeover within a short period of time. Plans are underway to accomplish this with the least possible disruption of service. However, your cooperation and patience will be appreciated.

Watch for additional information and publication of new telephone numbers as the occupancy date for the new facility approaches.

PARAMEDICS SERVING YOU

When a medical emergency strikes, whether it be automobile accident, an injury, breathing problems, heart attack or any other type of medical emergency, your first action should be to call the Maplewood Police Department at 777-8191. A Police Paramedic Unit is on duty 24 hours a day and will respond to your request within four minutes or less. Police Paramedic Officers who have undergone extensive training specializing in advanced coronary care and other medical emergencies at St. Paul Ramsey Hospital will answer your call for assistance.

Since its inception in 1975, the requests for paramedic service have doubled. They now respond to approximately 100 calls each month. Officers Jim Youngren, Jon Melander and Roger Lee have recently completed paramedic training and are now a part of the paramedic team, bringing the paramedic force to nine officers. Complementing and supporting the Paramedic Police Officer are members of the Gladstone, Hazelwood, Parkside and East County Line Volunteer Fire Departments. The men who man these rescue units have a continuing educational program and in-service training sessions and drills with the paramedics each month. The Paramedics receive monthly training sessions from physicians at St. Paul Ramsey Hospital and Medical Center. Training will continue for all personnel to keep them in a current state of readiness to better serve you.

Paramedic service is here, and they are ready to respond to your call for help! Phone stickers with police, fire and paramedic emergency phone numbers are available upon request from the Police Department. Free blood pressure checks are also available at the Police Department office, 1380 Frost Avenue.





The above graph represents the development which has occurred in the last five years within the City of Maplewood. The years of 1972, 1973, and 1974 represented a peak in development which was then followed by lessened activity. Indicators show that Maplewood can expect a significant rise in the number of single dwelling units in 1977 and that commercial and multiple dwelling units will commence an upward swing. 1973 shows a peak in commercial development due to the construction of the Maplewood Mall and additions to the 3M Complex. Single family construction reached a high in 1972 which is expected to be approached again in 1977. Multiple dwelling units, such as apartments, reached a high in 1974 and a low in 1976 with indications of an upward trend commencing in 1977.



A NEW PUBLIC WORKS

MAINTENANCE FACILITY?

Maplewood maintains 118 miles of roads, 108 miles of sanitary sewer, 240 acres of park lands, 42 miles of storm sewer, and many parts of the water system. Our population has grown from 17,000 to 30,000 since 1958, which is the year that the present garage site began serving the newly created Village of Maplewood. A corrugated metal building was erected that year. It is only partially heated and half the building has a dirt floor. That was the last and only time that any new maintenance building was constructed. Over the years, several old discarded garages have been donated to the City and moved onto the site.

This, then, is the facility that serves the City of Maplewood. Nearly twenty years and thirteen thousand people later, the existing garage remains the same, only the demands upon it have changed.

Nineteen people work out of the existing facility. They work for you. When streets need patching, parks need mowing, sewers back up or the snow must be plowed, it is these people whom you call upon for the services you need, but they, in turn, call upon their equipment to help them with the job, whatever it may be.

That equipment must be maintained in an "ever ready" condition, for it is the equipment that helps to make Maplewood's maintenance operation one of the most efficient in the metro area. Many communities of our size and population have twice as many maintenance employees and still do not have the same high degree of service that we here in Maplewood enjoy.

Currently the maintenance equipment is stored out of doors and is subject to repeated and costly vandalism. It must be repaired and made service-ready to meet a demand which could arise at any time, day or night. That same equipment sits outside and diminishes in value due to weathering; therefore, it must be replaced more rapidly than properly stored and maintained equipment. There is adequate area to service and/or repair only two pieces of equipment at a time. During concentrated activities, such as snow plowing, this results in lost time.

The proposed new maintenance facility is designed to meet all of the growing needs of our City. The details of the facility were contained in a brochure you received a short time ago. Meetings have been held. City employees are available to answer your questions. Now it is up to you. Vote February 8th.

WHICH SMOKE DETECTOR TO BUY?

The Fire Inspectors Association cannot recommend a specific brand or type of Smoke Detector. Our intention is to indicate to you the different types, and let you make the final decision.

First, look for the UL listing or FM approval, which is usually located on the back of the detector. This means the detector has been tested by an independent laboratory and should perform as advertised.

The following chart covers two types of power: Battery & AC, and their advantages and disadvantages. Also the two types of Smoke Detectors: Ionization and Photoelectric, and their advantages and disadvantages.

BATTERY POWER ONLY

Advantages:

Operates during power outages. All have audible low power signal. Some have an indication light to tell it is operating properly.

Disadvantages:

Batteries must be replaced annually. Some models have unusual batteries; replacement may be difficult to obtain.

A C POWER ONLY

Advantages:

No batteries to run down. After April 1, 1976, in all new one family dwellings in NY State, an AC type Smoke Detector must be installed adjacent to sleeping areas and permanently wired to the house electrical system. If there is more than one area, additional detectors are required.

Disadvantages:

In-operative during power outages. Plug-in models can be easily and accidentally disconnected unless the plug guard is used. Some people object to the appearance of the exposed power lead cord.

COMBINATION BATTERY & A C POWER

Recently introduced on the market. This type of power unit provides the advantages of battery and AC in one package.

IONIZATION TYPE DETECTOR °

Advantages:

Will detect invisible as well as visible products of combustion.

Disadvantages:

Low temperature and fumes other than combustion may cause a false alarm. (vapors from cooking)

PHOTOELECTRIC TYPE DETECTOR

Advantages:

Is faster in reacting to smokey fires than ionization type.

Disadvantages:

May not be as sensitive as the ionization type.

OUR BEST FRIEND NEEDS A LICENSE


Dog licenses are now available. The cost of the license is still \$1.50. However, a \$1.00 penalty will be added as of April, 1977. The following regulations must be adhered to before a dog license can be issued: (Source: Ordinance No. 368, Subd. 2) "No permit shall be granted for a dog which has not been vaccinated against rabies as provided in this section on said date, but not more than two years will have elapsed from the date of such vaccination to the time of the expiration of the license to be issued. Vaccination shall be performed only by a doctor qualified to practice veterinarian medicine in the state in which the dog is vaccinated and the applicant shall present a certificate from a qualified veterinarian showing that the dog to be licensed has been given a vaccination against rabies and the date on which said vaccination was administered.

MAYOR BRUTON RESIGNS

Mayor Robert Bruton announced his plans to resign from the Maplewood City Council at the regular meeting January 13. Tentative effective date is May 15.

His statement, in part said, "Regretfully, I must announce that I will be moving out of Maplewood and will have to resign as Mayor." He said three factors contributed to his decision: no plans to run for re-election, a decision to move from his present residence, and chance.

During discussion of the resignation by Council members, Bruton told them that now was an awkward time, "I feel I've tried to do the things I felt were good for the community, sometimes I failed, sometimes I didn't. However, he stated, "It's been interesting."

REMINDER - CANS AT THE CURB ARE A "NO-NO"

The City Code requires that all rubbish or garbage "shall be placed in one and a half mil minimum polyethylene bags" when placed for pickup next to the curb or alley line. The placement of garbage cans at the alley or street line is prohibited at all times. The plastic garbage bags disappear with the garbage collector, but garbage cans remain as a visual and health problem until removed by the resident. Your cooperation is appreciated.



The water system in Maplewood is different from most other cities in that the City does not have its own municipal water system. Instead, water is supplied from the North St. Paul and St. Paul water departments and these cities bill Maplewood residents directly for water consumption.

This billing arrangement complicates the financing of water system improvements in Maplewood. Normally system improvements (i.e. water storage tanks, pump stations, trunk mains, etc.) are financed by a bond issue. The amount needed for annual debt service payments is taken into consideration when water rates are set to provide water consumption revenue sufficient for both operating and debt service (system improvement) costs. However, since Maplewood does not bill its residents for water, it cannot raise water rates to finance system improvements. Consequently, special financing arrangements are necessary to pay for system improvements in Maplewood.

In 1973, the City established a water availability charge (W.A.C.) that is required to be paid whenever a water connection is made. The current W.A.C. fee is \$150 per unit wherein a unit is equal to a single family dwelling. Revenue from W.A.C. fees are dedicated for the financing of water system improvements. However, major system improvements currently in progress for both the St. Paul and North St. Paul water districts within Maplewood will require amounts in excess of W.A.C. funds that are presently available. Rather than increase the W.A.C. fee, the City Council has decided to use alternative financing techniques.

The method presently being used to finance North St. Paul water district improvements is a surcharge added to water bills. This is in lieu of a water rate increase for everyone served by North St. Paul because the system improvement benefits Maplewood residents only. St. Paul water district improvements were originally planned to be financed by a similar surcharge. However, the City Council is currently planning on billing residents in the St. Paul water district a fire protection charge which would be listed as an additional item on Maplewood sewer bills. This charge would be billed to residents that are presently connected to the St. Paul water system and to those that are not connected but have water available. The latter group was included because their benefit from fire hydrants is equal to those that are connected. At the April 14th Council meeting, first reading of an ordinance was approved which would establish a fire protection charge at \$.07 per 1,000 gallons. This rate would amount to \$1.90 a quarter for a single-family dwelling. The second and final reading of this ordinance is scheduled for the May 26th Council meeting.

PUBLIC WORKS DEPARTMENT NEWS

1) Dutch Elm Disease

The City of Maplewood's 1977 "Diseased Tree Program" commenced during the last week of April with the hiring of three State certified Tree Inspectors. Returning this year is Mr. Tom Rasmussen and new inspectors are Mr. Lyle Mueller and Mr. Igor Fejda. Tree removal will be carried out this year by the "Bred-Well Inc." tree service of Stevens Point, Wisconsin. Trees determined to have Dutch Elm Disease or Oak Wilt will be marked for removal by the tree inspectors. The property owner will then be advised that it must be removed within seven (7) calendar days. If not removed within the allotted period of time, it will be placed on the Tree Removers list for removal.

The "Grant-in-Aid" Program will be continued this year for tree owners who have an independent tree removal service remove a marked tree. Two competitive bids must accompany the "Grant-in-Aid" application to qualify.

- 2) The City Council has awarded the successful low bidder a contract for construction of an elevated water storage tank on a site just south of Highway 36 near German Street. It is anticipated to be operational by mid-summer of 1978. Increased water pressure can be expected in those surrounding areas.
- 3) A new Public Works building will commence construction this year in an area south of County Road "B" and east of Hazel Street. This new facility was approved by a Referendum Vote on February 8, 1977 and should be partially operational in early 1978. With a contract letting date set for early July of this year, it is hoped to be completed by the following summer.
- 4) N.E. Maplewood Streets

The City Council has recently instructed the City Public Works Department to develop construction plans to open Lydia Avenue, Beam Avenue and Radatz Street between White Bear Avenue and McKnight Road. Construction is to be consistent with the existing street design and quality of the involved streets.

Pictured is Maplewood's Assistant Fire Marshal, James Embertson. Jim is a native of St. Paul (Midway area) and graduated from Wilson High School in 1957. He and his wife and children moved to Maplewood in 1964 and in October of that year he joined the Gladstone Fire Department. Previous to his employment with the City on April 13, 1977, Jim was employed by the Twin Cities Army Ammunitions Plant — Fire Dept. for ten years.



New additions to the Police Department are officers Jeff Melander and James Meehan. Jeff, 32, lives with his parents at 1719 E. Rose Street, St. Paul. Meehan, 26, also resides with his parents at 1756 Berkeley, St. Paul. Melander and Meehan started Bureau of Criminal Apprehension Training on February 7th and graduated from Basic School in April. Both officers will serve one year as probationary employees prior to permanent appointment.

GO OUT ON A LIMB FOR MAPLEWOOD

Maplewood recently purchased a tree moving machine and is on the outlook for trees to be transplanted into City Parks. If you are building an addition, or garage, or would just like to donate a tree, we have a park for you. The following points should be considered before donating a tree:

1. A maximum of 4"-5" diameter is the biggest tree we can accept.
2. The tree must be at least 5' from any building.
3. The truck is 35' in length and 8' wide and 7'6" high and weighs 3 tons.
4. We cannot accept diseased trees.

If you would like to have a tree removed from your property, contact our office at 777-8131, ext. 40, and one of our staff will visit your home to determine if we can move the tree.

By donating your tree, you will save the time and effort of removing the tree yourself or paying to have it removed. You will also receive a great deal of satisfaction from knowing your gift is being enjoyed by others. We will begin moving trees as soon as the ground is dry enough to work on without damaging the turf.

NEW PATROL VEHICLES

Maplewood Police have entered into a new departure in mobile patrol vehicles.

For the first time in its history the Police Department is using vehicles for patrol work.

The Maplewood Police Department has signed an agreement with Countryside Volkswagon, Saab Inc., a local dealer, to lease two 1977 Saab 5-door Sedans on an experimental basis for one year. The lease specifies that Countryside will do all maintenance and warranty work, while the City carries the necessary insurance.

The Saabs are equipped with a 4 cylinder, 4 stroke in-line engine with continuous fuel injection, generating 115 H.P. The transmission is a 4 speed manual type, featuring front-wheel drive. Tires are 14" radials.

Each vehicle will be equipped with a red oscillating light and electronic siren. Communication will be with MX-350 Pac Sets and chargers. Both cars will have the necessary first aid equipment, fire extinguishers and police shotguns.

Use of these new patrol vehicles is expected to economize gasoline consumption by the department. Saab, with this engine and transmission, has a combined highway-City rate of 26 miles per gallon. Currently police patrol vehicles are averaging about 8 miles per gallon.

Patrol officers using the Saabs are pleased with their maneuverability, comfort and acceleration response.

Saab patrol vehicles are currently being used by several police departments. Among them Vail, Colorado, who report they are pleased with the front wheel-drive feature on snowy mountainous roads.

A close evaluation of the performance of these vehicles will be done during the experimental year.

CANINE PROGRAM

Officer Richard Lang reports his partner, Laddie, has now completed all his training and is in full service with the Police Department.

Lang points with pride to the excellent job Laddie is doing, citing instances where Laddie has aided and assisted police officers.

Several building searches have been conducted. Generally these are when the patrols have found open doors or responded to intrusion alarms. The Canine Unit can quickly search a darkened building for intruders, lessening the danger to an officer and allowing police officers to clear the call quickly and return to service.

Laddie also has assisted in breaking up large field drinking parties, tracked robbery suspects, helped apprehend hit and run drivers and assisted in prisoner security.

Perhaps Laddie's most rewarding accomplishment occurred on October 9th when officer James Meehan, on his way to work at 6:35 a.m., spotted a suspicious vehicle in the parking lot of the Group Health Center at County Road B and White Bear Avenue. Officer Meehan drove into the lot to check when five young men exited the vehicle and ran in a westerly direction. Upon checking the vehicle, Meehan noted the ignition had been punched. He called for assistance. Officer Lang and Laddie responded. Lang set Laddie on the trail. Laddie tracked the fleeing parties across a large open field to Ryan Equipment Company where he held three young men against the wall until Lang and fellow officers arrived and placed them under arrest. The other two young men had climbed on to the roof of the building and quickly surrendered.

The five apprehended young men admitted stealing the car in St. Paul and were referred to Juvenile authorities. Officers felt without Laddie's assistance the culprits would not have been apprehended.

COUNCIL ADOPTS 1978 BUDGET

On September 29th, the Council approved the City's budget for 1978. Budgeted operating expenses are approximately 6% over 1977 and interest expense on bonded debt is 17% higher than 1977. Copies of the 1978 Budget will be distributed to all departments during the last week in December.

The tax levy for 1978 is \$2,675,710 compared to \$2,372,124 for 1977. Although the mill rate will increase, taxes on an average house will decrease due to a change in the formula for calculating taxable assessed value. In 1977, the assessed value was calculated as 25% of the first \$13,000 of limited market value and 40% of the excess. In 1978, the assessed value will be calculated as 22% of the first \$15,000 of limited market value plus 36% of the excess

BOND SALE SAVES OVER \$300,000

On September 29th, the City Council approved the sale of \$4,815,000 of Advance Refunding Bonds to refinance existing bonds which has a higher interest rate than the current market rate. Interest saved on the refinancing amounts to \$342,695. This savings will result in lower property taxes for the retirement of bonded debt. However, there will be no sudden drop in property taxes because the savings will be spread over the next twenty years which is the repayment period of the new bonds.

SENIOR CITIZEN SEWER RATES

Reduced sewer rates are available for senior citizens in the City of Maplewood. To be eligible for this rate, the applicant must sign an affidavit at the City Clerk's office, 1380 Frost Avenue. Only residentially owned property, occupied by no more than two persons, and wherein one of the occupants must be 65 years of age or older and the other at least 62 years of age, and the residence being directly billed for sewer service by the City of Maplewood, shall be eligible for senior citizen rates.

Affidavits shall be required each year and shall be filed after November 1st and before December 15th of each year for applicability of a reduced rate for all quarters of the following year. Therefore, Citizens presently receiving a reduced rate must sign a new affidavit prior to December 15, 1977, to maintain the reduced rate in 1978. If you have not signed the affidavit for 1978, we are looking forward to you coming in and doing so.

WATER SYSTEM FINANCING

Water Availability Charges, Water Surcharges, and Fire Protection Charges

The water system in Maplewood is different from most other cities in that the City does not have its own municipal water system. Instead, water is supplied from the North St. Paul and St. Paul water departments and these cities bill Maplewood residents directly for water consumption.

This billing arrangement complicates the financing of water system improvements in Maplewood. Normally system improvements (i.e. water storage tanks, pump stations, trunk mains, etc.) are financed by a bond issue. The amount needed annually to pay off the bonds is taken into consideration when water rates are set to provide water consumption revenue sufficient for both operating and bonding (system improvement) costs. However, since Maplewood does not bill its residents for water, it cannot raise water rates to finance system improvements. Consequently, special financing arrangements are necessary to pay for system improvements in Maplewood.

In 1973, the City established a water availability charge (W.A.C.) that is required to be paid whenever a water connection is made. The current W.A.C. fee is \$150 per unit wherein a unit is equal to a single family dwelling. Revenue from W.A.C. fees are dedicated for the financing of water system improvements. However, major system improvements currently in progress for both the St. Paul and North St. Paul Water Districts within Maplewood will require amounts in excess of W.A.C. funds that are presently available. Rather than increase the W.A.C. fee, the City Council has decided to use alternative financing techniques.

The method presently being used to finance North St. Paul Water District improvements is a surcharge added to water bills. This is in lieu of a water rate increase for everyone served by North St. Paul because the system improvement benefits Maplewood residents only. St. Paul Water District improvements were originally planned to be financed by a similar surcharge. However, the City Council adopted an ordinance on June 8, 1977 which established a fire protection charge for the availability of water. It is called a fire protection charge because it is levied against all properties (whether or not connected to water) that benefit from the availability of fire hydrants. This charge is included on sewer bills for customers within the St. Paul Water District.

NEW DEVELOPMENT FOR MAPLEWOOD

The City has recently received proposals for two new developments; a Holiday Inn and an amusement park.

A new Holiday Inn is proposed to be erected northwest of and adjacent to the Maplewood Mall. This new Inn will contain a dining room, a cocktail lounge, meeting rooms and the rental area itself which will be comprised of 120 rooms. Construction is planned to begin this fall and completion is anticipated for the summer of 1978.

An amusement park has recently been proposed to be located on Rice Street across from McCarrons Lake. The proposed amusement park is to be constructed in phases. The immediate proposal is for an 18 hole miniature golf course, go-cart track, and miscellaneous amusement games. Future development may include the addition of a nine hole pitch and putt course, archery range, bumper cars, and train ride. Phase I is planned to open in the summer of 1978.

With the snow season coming up fast, we wish to remind you that enforcement action will be taken by the Police Department for violations of the following City Ordinances:

Chapter 403.060 — Parking of any vehicle upon any street or road for more than (30) minutes during the time intervening between a snow-fall and the plowing of such snow is hereby prohibited.

Chapter 403.070 — Parking of any vehicle upon any street or road for more than (2) hours between the hours of 2:00 a.m. and 6:00 a.m. is hereby prohibited.

It is beneficial to all citizens for the Public Works Department to be able to plow our city streets wide and clear, therefore any continued violation will result in the issuance of a court summons, or in emergency situations, the vehicle may be towed away. Help us in keeping your streets clear and safe this winter season.

As well as being an enormous help in keeping travel as normal as possible on Minnesota winter days, this vehicle that plows and sands our streets can be very dangerous. The people driving them are constantly concerned about small children close to the roadway and other vehicles following too closely behind them as they go about their task of keeping Maplewood streets in good traveling condition. There are winter snow conditions when the driver must stop his forward plowing motion and back up before continuing on to the job right, especially at entersections. Our drivers do not want to have accidents, but following to close behind them could cause one. They are asking you to lend them a hand. Don't ride too close to them and above all, instruct your children in the fact that these vehicles could be dangerous to them. It will make everyone's winter season a lot safer.






